The bird was junco-sized and of similar shape. Its plumare was buff brown above with noticeable brown streaks on the back. It had a light eye stripe. It was very white below from throat to flank with brown streaking extending from below the chin to the flanks, Its outer tail feathers were white. Its legs were flesh-colored. Its bill was thin and straight and similar to a warders.

Describe the bird's calls or sounds, if heard; including method of deliveryi.e., from perch, in flight, etc.:
The bird did not atter any calls or sounds which we could hear.

Thist similar species and how you eliminated them:

( Water Pipit - Seen concurrently w/spragues; Dark back and legs and much greyer overall plumage above, much tanner plumage below.

(Vesper Sparrow-has chestnut shoulder patch, usually hops rather than walks, has conical finchetype bill.

As Water Pipits had been under observation for 70 minutes prior to the sudden appearance of the Spragues, the simultaneous observation of both species provided excellent means of comparation of feet prior experience with this and similar species:

I have never seen this species before or the Water Pipit before.

I am familiar with Vesper sparrows and other sparrows and finches with which it could possibly be confused.
