Describe the habitat in which you observed the bird: Drainage canals were adjacent to Great Salt Lake into which they flowed. Expised mydflats were adjacent to the canals.

The birds stood about 2 feet tall and were stender bodied with long legs and neck. Plummage was white. The bill was about 3 inches, stender, and straight, and was light gray in color. The legs were long and stender and gray-green in color. The tail was short and slightly-rounded, extending to the end of the wings. The birds walked in a nearly upright position.

List similar species and how you eliminated them:

Showy Egret - this species has a black bill and black
legs with yellow feet and is slightly smaller in size
than Little Blue Heron. Both species were observed
together in the field

Cattle Egret - this species has a yellow bill and yellow

legs and a shorter, stockier neck.
