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

Thanks for your note.

As for a description, let me word as I would have in 1981.

A smallish bird, about sparrow sized, mostly yellowish, with a distinctive black and yellow head.

I do not know if I knew it was a warbler the moment I saw it. I was pretty new to birding and warblers then.

I do recall that it was either on the ground or not far off of it, no more than ten feet. It was not in the canopy. No warbler neck was involved.

I probably saw this bird and looked all the way through the last half (passerines)

of the Golden guide to find that bird that matched. I do not recall "force fitting" what I saw to the picture. I recall being certain of what I saw based on

the illustration in the Golden guide.
