A large gull, light grayish brown plumage. Bill was all very dark, thick, with more curvature especially in the

gonys area.

Overall the bird appeared fairly uniform in color, especially on the back and breast. There was some mottling on the wing coverts but this was less than on the Herring and Thayers Gulls present. Legs appeared pinkish, gray.

The tips of the primaries when the bird was perched were the same Color than the wing coverts and certainly not darker. They had

even paler edges to the tips.

In flight the primaries were flashy white from below. There was no color all the way to the wing tips. From above they were just light grayish brown. The tail appeared light grayish, brown and lacked the tail band seen on Thayers and Herring Gulls. There was no dark secondary bar on the wing.

In flight the gull seemed heavier and bulkier than the Thayers.

Voice or call notes and method of delivery: None differentiated form the rest of the 1000s of gulls

Sat for long periods of time on a frozen pond, would on acca-Behavior: tion fly around and eat garbage!

Habitat: Dump with an adjacent frozen pond.

What similar species might it have been and how were these eliminated:

Bill too thick with more curvature, primary tips too Thayers light, more evenly colored plumage, primaries from above lacked the tips that were darker than the wing coverts when the bird flew. Bulkier bird. Lacked dark secondary bar.

The combination of large, all dark bill, flashy white primaries, no tail band, no dark secondary bar rules out all similar species.

What experience have you had with this and similar species:

I have spent 100s of hours sorting gulls out at the Salt Lake dump. I have seen Glaucous-winged gulls several times in California.
