DESCRIPTION. Write a detailed description of the bird's appearance, including size, shape, plumage pattern color, and any unique features.

Small Buteo with a long tail that extended well beyond the folded wings when the bird was perched. The tail was destinctly banded with several dark bands and several narrow whitish bands. In flight these white bands were very obvious especially when the bird was lighting. Also the white spots on the wings were very noticealbe as were light areas at the base of the primaries, The breast and belly was buffy with light streaking.

Similar Species

Red-tailed Hawk-Tail proportionately shorter, bands on tail diferent-dark bands smaller and less distinct. Doesn't usually show the pale windows at the base of primaries.

Accipitars fly differents and have different silhouette.

Behavior: Perched on poles and in trees. When if flew and attempted to land it would swoops up to perch in or on whatever.
