Large, white birds, with long, yellow bills and black legs. Plumage entirely white; the largest bird with plumes extending over the tail and drooping into the water. Heads were long rather than rounded, but the bills exceeded the heads in length. Legs were glossy black, with black feet. Even the smaller birds were more than twice the body length of the American Avocets and Black-necked Stilts that fed around them. The long necks were carried in an "S" curve that showed the shape even when the birds were sitting in a hunched position.

Voice or call notes and method of delivery:

Behavior: Birds were standing in a hunched position. They moved around nervously as I drove around them.

Habitat: Empty sewage pond with small puddles of rain water.

What similar species might it have been and how were these eliminated: Both Snowy and Cattle Egrets are much smaller, closer to the size of the Avocets. These birds were nearly as large as Great Blue Herons. Snowy Egret has a black bill. Cattle Egret has a more rounded head, with the bill shorter than the head depth.

What experience have you had with this and similar species: I have seen and photographed this species in the San Francisco area. Snowy Egrets are common migrants here.
