The bird had greenish upperparts and bright yellow underparts and a warbler bill. The crown was black and shaded into dark green on the neck and the sides of the neck. From the side, the forehead and face were bright yellow with a dark prominent eye. The dark hood formed a semicircle around the face. The bird would flick open its tail clearly showing white outer tail feathers. The center tail feathers were dark.

Voice or call notes and method of delivery:

Behavior: The bird was at all times within five feet of the ground. flew from the underbrush into the open where I obseved it spreading its tail open, then into more underbrush then it disappered

It was in an isolated clump of trees. There are large trees with Habitat: much undergrowth. At the south end, where the bird was observed is standing water. Just south of the clump of trees is a cattail marsh.

What similar species might it have been and how were these eliminated: The Wilson's Warbler can be ruled out because it lacks the olive around the sides of the neck and does not have white outer tail feathers nor does it spread its tail.

What experience have you had with this and similar species:

I am very familiar with Wilson's Warbler and all other warblers commonly occuring in Utah.

Books, illustrations, and advice consulted, and how did these influence this description:

I was birding with Paul Lehman at the time and we were separated. When I first observed the bird I called for him to come as I felt I had a Hooded Warbler. He said that just prior to my calling Significance hof had oid the endantly heard the distinctive call of a Hooded Warbler

If accepted it would be the second record for Utah.
