If you watch birds solely for your own enjoyment, a written description of your observations is unnecessary. Compilers of regional bird lists must insist that their records be scientifically sound; future bird students--those studying occurrences 50 years from now--must have a written record on which to depend. By providing the verifying written description, you are employing a basic rule of the scientific method.

We recognize that experienced field observers can provide important and reliable records, if supported by an adequate verifying description. Thus this request is an effort to perpetuate your record by obtaining concrete evidence which may be permanently preserved for examination by others in the future. This procedure is required for every extraordinary observation, irrespective of the observer. Despite the common name, it is not a duck.

Describe the bird's overall behavior:

Heard a single bird calling which alerted me to its presence. Went outside the house & observed it on a telephone wire. I attempted to get closer at first, & followed its general direction of flight to a vacant lot where it alighted. Two other birds to the right of me & another one on a telephone wire were in position able to approach the two on the wire & seemed desirous of socializing with each other.

Describe the habitat in which you observed the bird:
Residential - trees, houses, vacant lots & power or telephone lines.

My parents had heard the bird & identified it as a King Pigeon. They also stated that it was a different species than the Rock Dove.

All three birds were on telephone wires about 30-35 ft. above the ground. The first thing I noticed was the似岩鳩 appearance on the underparts which contrasted with the black - very unlike a Mourning Dove. The birds were gray overall with the scaly-looking feathers. The bird just smaller than a Mourning Dove, but had its general shape - fairly slender with a pointed, longish tail. From below I could see that the underparts of especially the outer tail feathers. The birds didn't fly & from below I did not see the chestnut-colored primaries. But all the other fieldmarks were visible.

Describe the bird's calls or sounds, if heard; including method of delivery-- i.e., from perch, in flight, etc.:

The calls were a rapid series, coming similar to Mourning Dove or Rock Dove, delivered from perch on wires. My parents had never heard them calling from trees near their home.

List similar species and how you eliminated them:

Not a Mourning Dove because of differences in size, markings and wings (scaly-like) & call.

Smaller & slimmer than Rock Doves.

These birds had pointed tails & were scaly-like in marking & were larger than common Ground Doves which has short tails & no scaly-like markings.

Prior experience with this and similar species:

I had seen this species Common Ground Dove in previous years. I have seen hundreds of Mourning Doves & Rock Doves before & it definitely was not any of these.
