Description of bird: Size, colors, all field marks OBSERVED. - Unique features of this individual, if any.

- Size- Larger than Killdeer with which it was sharing the field, and smaller than the Avocets which we had seen earlier in the morning.
- Head- Dove headed, with brownish crown and white throat; large dark eyes.

 The bill was pale and straight and rather short (about width of head) for a shorebird. There was a slight rich brownish color on the cheek.

 It also had a fairly long, thin neck compared to the rest of the body.
- Back- Brownish with lighter feather edgings which gave kind of a scaly appearance.
- Underparts- Buffy on neck and throat giving way to light barring on lower breast and flanks.
- Legs- Yellowish, but not as strong a yellow as on the Greater or Lesser Yellowlegs.
- Wings- Long, almost pointed with very dark primaries and lighter, brown and buff secondaries, tertials and wing coverts.
- Tail- Darker dorsally with lighter-colored outer tail feathers. Fairly long tail as it extended beyond the wing tips as the bird foraged.
