DEAR ELLA,

HERE ARE TWO MORE BIRD SIGHTINGS FOR THE SPRING SEASON & DESCRIPTIONS OF THE TWO RUDDY TURNSTONES I SAW.

BLUE-GRAY Gnatcatcher - 23 APRIL 1990 - HEARD ONE CALLING IN THE JUNIPERS AT THE NORTHWEST CORNER OF STANSBURY ISLAND, SAW 2 THE NEXT MORNING AT THE SAME PLACE. I WAS ALONE AT THE TIME.

LEWIS' WOODPECKER - 16 MAY 1990 - SAW 1 PERCHED ON A PHONE POLE AT THE NORTH END OF PROMONTORY POINT, ABOUT 2 MILES NW OF GOLDEN SPUR NATIONAL MONUMENT - 5FT BY 10 OTHERS ON A FIGO TREE I WAS LEADING.

Ruddy Turnstone - on 23 May 1990 saw 1 in breeding plumage at 15:30 on the south side of East Lake at Locomotive Springs. The bird was feeding on mudflats adjacent to Great Salt Lake. Weather was 20% clouds with light wind. I was able to get within 70m of the bird, which I viewed with a 22x spotting scope. The bird was approximately 2 times larger than adjacent Western Sandpipers, with bright orange legs, white belly, mottled rufous/black wings & a black/white 'crown' face. I have seen 100's of Ruddy Turnstones, so didn't think much of the observation until I came out of the field and read about their status in Utah. I was alone when I saw the bird.

- on 30 May 1990, I saw another Ruddy Turnstone with Joe Engler at the north end of Fish Springs National Wildlife Refuge. Bird was first seen in flight, exhibiting the distinctive black/white wing pattern on the upper wing surface. We stopped the truck, and viewed the bird through a 22x scope under good light conditions, seeing 'crown' face, rufous/black wings, white belly, & orange legs. No doubt about the identity of the bird, viewed for 2-3 minutes.
