If you watch birds solely for your own enjoyment, a written description of your observations is unnecessary. But, if you have seen something unusual, and would like to share this with others, a written description is essential. Compilers of regional bird lists must insist that their records be scientifically sound; future bird students—those studying occurrences 50 years from now—must have a written record on which to depend. By providing the verifying written description, you are employing a basic rule of the scientific method.

We recognize that experienced field observers can provide important and reliable records, if supported by an adequate verifying description. Thus this request is an effort to perpetuate your record by obtaining concrete evidence which may be permanently preserved for examination by others in the future. This procedure is required for every extraordinary observation, irrespective of the observer.

Describe the bird's overall behavior:  WHILE DRIVING THE INNER CURLEW DIKE AT ABOUT 10 MPH. THE CUCKOO FLEW  FROM A STAND of PHRAGMITES /BULRUSH. MOVED PARALLEL TO THE TRUCK (ON N  SIDE) ABOUT 25-30' AWAY CROSSED IN FRONT OF TRUCK + LANDED IN A THIN PATCH  OF BULRUSH ALONG THE ROAD + WATER (ABOUT SO' AWAY). THE BIRD WAS  APPROACHED ON FOOT WHERE IT THEN FLUSHED BACK TOWARD ITS ORIGINAL  SIDET + PASSING AT MOST 25' FROM OBSERVERS. IT THEN LANDED BACK IN  THE ORIGINAL STAND OF PHRAGMITES. ITS FLIGHT WAS 15' OR LESS FROM  Describe the habitat in which you observed the bird:  MARSH AREA DOMINATED BY PHRAGMITES AND BULRUSH STANDS,  WITH SOME SALTGRASS AND FAIR INTERSPERSION OF WATER.

THE FLUSHED BIRD EXHIBITED THE TYPICAL BROWNISH BACK + WHITE UNDERPARTS OF THE CUCKOOS AND THE SOMEWHAT FLOPPY FLIGHT. THE LONG TAIL GAVE THE BIRD AWAY AS A CUCKOO. AS THE BIRD LANDED. THE WHITISH TIPS ON TAIL COULD BE SEEN, AS COULD THE RUFOUS ON THE PRIMARIES - THUS CLINCHING THE BIRD AS A YELLOW-BILLED, WHEN APPROACHED ON FOOT THE BIRD FLUSHED, ACTUALLY COMING BACK. TOWARDS OBSERVERS. THE YELLOW LOWER MANDIBLE WAS CLEARLY SEEN AS WAS THE RUFOUS ON THE WINGS & THE LONG TAIL. THE WHITE ON THE TAIL FEATHERS WAS AGAIN OBSERVED DURING FLIGHT & AS THE BIRD LANDED IN THICK PHRAGMITES / BULRUSH.

THE BIRD WAS NOT PURSUED FURTHER, AS IDENTIFICATION WAS CLEAR.
