Plumage - Most notable was a dark mask on the face that tent continued down on both sides of the throat of then ended where yellow on throat ended

- No dark on throat itself yellow, then to white
- white eyebrow stripe & white in back of black mask on side of head
 - Eye within mask
- Streaky black marks on side
- Only noticed one wing bor but I didn't focus on this feature very well
- Gray on back, top of head
- Dark bill

Back-capped Marphology - About the same size as the Chickadees it was with.

- Posture more horizontal than chickadees
- Warper-shaped

Voice or call notes: None

Behavior: Foraging in tops of pine trees. It would occasionally flit out from the tree & back as if it was fly catching. The bird was within a "wave" of small passavines, including Black-capped of mountain chickadees & Red-breasted nuthafches.

Habitat: Habitat: Tops of pine trees, urban pack.

Describe what specific features you saw or heard that caused you to reach your conclusion: - Dark mask continuing to bars on side of yellow throat - rack of dark marks on throat or belly.

What similar species might it have been and how were these eliminated: Jellow-rumped Warber: Dark black mask eliminated this (& other feature) Grace's Warbler: Same Canada Warbler: Sta There were no black marks on belly or throat
