Description:

This bird flew into my apple tree and lit on the feeder. I put the binoculars on it because it obviously wasn't an American Goldfinch, though it was approximately the same size. But it had no black 'cap' on the forehead and seemed to be darker on its back. It had a bright yellow throat and a slightly paler yellow breast. The back and rump were gray and it had two white bars on each wing.

This bird had a black vireo-shaped bill, a bright yellow throat and white wing-bars. It had obvious "yellow spectacles" around its eyes, and these markings were emphasized by dark olive color on the top and sides of the head, which was the same color as the back of the head and shoulders.

For part of the 10 minutes I watched this bird, it shared the feeder with a whitecrowned sparrow, which was approximately the same size.

Voice or call notes and method of delivery: Not observed.

Behavior:

Perched in apple tree and at feeder (stocked with a commercial finch mix)

Habitat:

Shady, residential back yard that opens onto 6.5 acres of open pasture. Apple,

maple, Russian olive and aspen trees.

What similar species might it have been and how were these eliminated:

Lesser Goldfinch — This was my first thought because of the darker head and back, plus the wing bars. But my bird had a dark, top-slightly-curved bill and yellow eye rings.

Pine Warbler — My bird had a heavier bill than a warbler and no streaking on its underparts. Also, from pictures it appears the warbler's eye marking is more of a streak above the eye. My bird had definite "spectacles."

What experience have you had with this and similar species?

No experience with Yellow Throated Vireo. Have seen other vireos (Red-Eyed and Solitary) and Lesser Goldfinch occasionally. Have never seen a Pine Warbler.

I'm an experienced birder and run the Hotline for Bridgerland Audubon Society.
